IV. Discussion of Objective Success Definitions

The team discussed key factors that would signal success on each objective:

Objective 1: Leverage and sustain new and existing funding

 We know what services are needed, and there is timely and adequate funding and resources available, accessed, and sustained to support those services



- What do we want to do to improve? What services needed?
- Timely, so no waitlists.
- What are we sustaining (services)? So we know what funding we need?
- Increased access of available funding and resources that haven't been used before (private and public)
 - Efficient use of funding
 - Need to know what funding exists now (funding sources, levels, from all sources)
 - Towns forgiving property tax bills for child care providers (free rent, use of space)
 - Think broadly about all services these families need (e.g., transportation)
- Coordination of funding and resources across sources to support needed services (private - philanthropy, business; and public - Federal, State, and Local)
 - Braided funding across sources
 - Consolidation of data to allow us to know what we need, what's available, and what what's being accessed - to inform decisions
 - Like with the FRCs (shared data system)
 - Office of Early Childhood?
 - Strengthen the funding partnerships across Departments (including DOE)
- Services are sustained beyond the PDG grant with new and existing funding and resources (Federal, state, and local public and private - philanthropic, business)
 - Some will come from CDHSC
 - Funding from the state and other funding streams as well
 - Have missed out on Federal grants because the State hasn't been investing
 - Policy
 - Does it support the strategic work going forward

Objective 2: Increase business and community support for early childhood programs and services

- Businesses are more family-friendly
 - HR in businesses are sharing information about early childhood supports and services available
 - Family friendly business badge (offer benefits like flexible work schedules, etc.)
 - Businesses receive a tax incentive to subsidize child care
 - Towns are doing some of this now
 - Businesses offer incentives (donate time or resources) SELA
 - Increase engagement of businesses



- We need a baseline of what's happening now, identify promising practices and replicating those
- Sustain the support that businesses have been forced to provide due to the pandemic to hire workers
- Work, Stay, Play Education/Media Campaign
 - Strengthening families business model
 - Educate businesses about what it means for business to strengthen and support families
- Policy in practice versus dollars
 - Non-cash benefits vs. cash opportunities
 - In terms of education and developing a rationale for additional funding
- increasing business and community support → make them aware of the gap so they can be engaged to help make a difference
- Communities are more supportive of families
 - Social norms change (Longer-term effort)
 - Hard in NH with a culture that pull yourself up by your bootstraps
 - Promote strengthening families, universal support
 - Look at areas that do this well (North County)
 - They collaborate well (Early Learning Coalition and the FRC Network)
 - Universal preventive and supportive services are available, not just prevention
 - More investment in primary prevention
 - Connection to community is a protective factor
 - Families and children thrive
 - Enhance home visiting (universal home visiting and other services)
 - Transition from one set of services to another (PreK to kindergarten)
 - Communities are knowledgeable about what families need, know about, and can offer/suggest resources
 - Libraries librarian suggests good books on child development
 - State support of FRCs embedded in communities and providing support broadly to community
 - Funding is hodgepodge
 - Looking for sustained funding, especially through the State
 - Identify nontraditional partners and maximize/promote their efforts
 - Grocery stores healthy foods campaigns
 - Home Depot projects kids can do
